









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Protein Sources (1 sv/day) and Risk of NHS, 1980-2006 (3162 cases)

Preventable by Simultaneous Reduction of Five Modifiable Risk Factors (NHS) (Hu et al.)

Low Risk

- 1. Nonsmoking
- 2. BMI < 25
- 3. Moderate to vigorous exercise
- 4. Diet score in upper 40% (low trans fat, high cereal fiber, low glycemic load, high P:S ratio)
- 5. Alcohol 5+ grams/day

Percent in low risk group: 4.1%

Population attributable risk (PAR): 92% (82-96)
